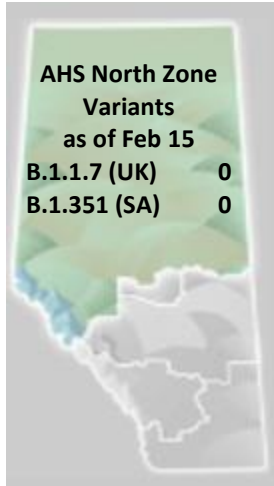


COVID-19 UPDATE

The Province of Alberta has declared a [State of Local Public Health Emergency](#) (November 24, 2020)
 Under the RMWB Bylaw and the Provincial Restrictions, [Masks are now mandatory in any indoor public space.](#)

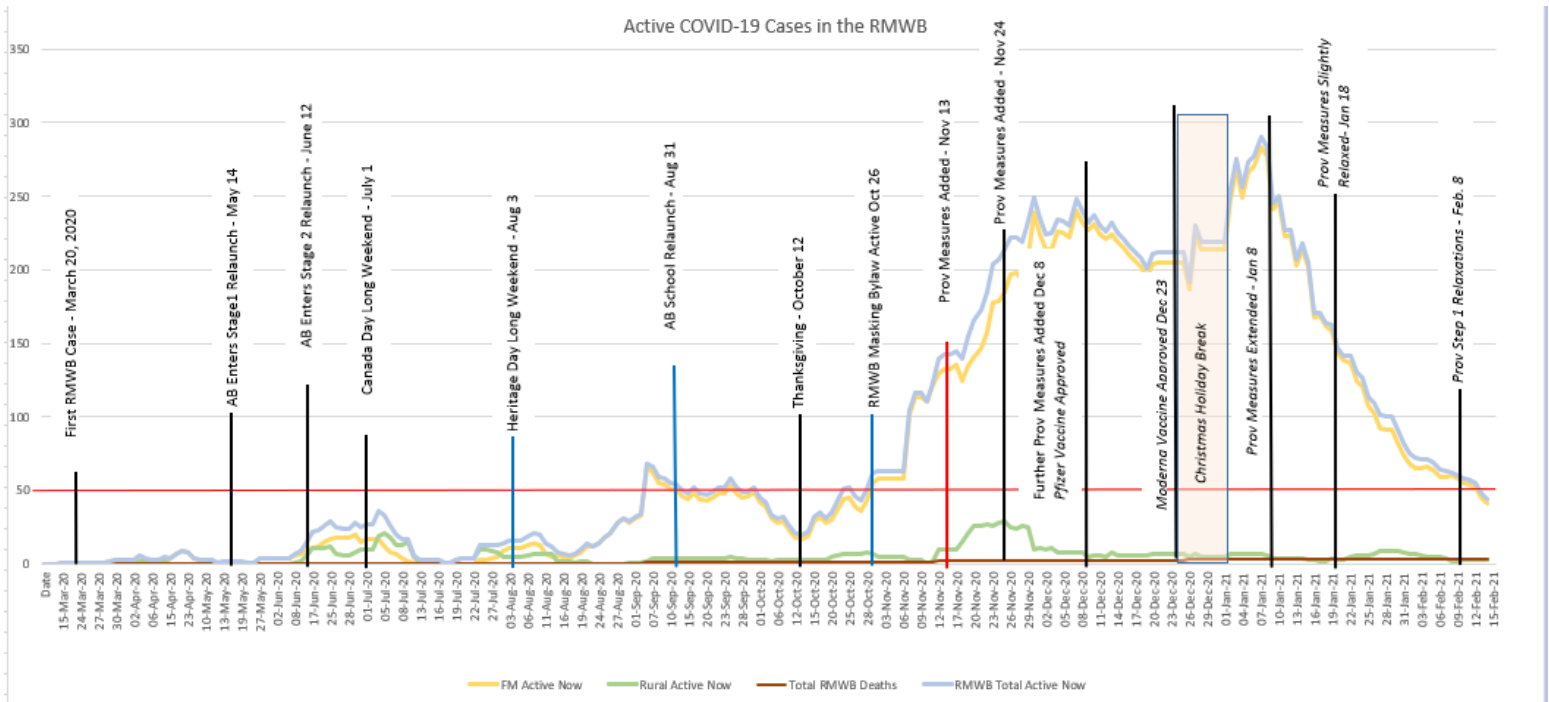

Path Forward – Currently in Step 1

The Path Forward – Public health measures will be eased in steps based on hospitalization benchmarks. Each step sets a more predictable path for easing restrictions, while protecting the health system. Once hospitalizations are within range of the benchmark, decisions to move to the next step will be considered. The lowest-risk activities in each sector will be considered for change first. Moving between steps will happen at least 3 weeks apart to assess the impact on cases. For more details visit alberta.ca/enhanced-public-health-measures

Continue following existing public health measures:

- Stay 2 metres apart from others
- Wear a mask in public spaces, indoor workplaces and places of worship
- Practice good hygiene: wash your hands often and cover coughs and sneezes
- Monitor your symptoms every day
- If sick, stay home, get tested, and follow mandatory isolation requirements while waiting for results:
 - if positive, isolate for 10 days or until symptoms are gone, whichever is longer
 - if negative, stay home until you're better
- Download and use the ABTraceTogether contact tracing app when out in public

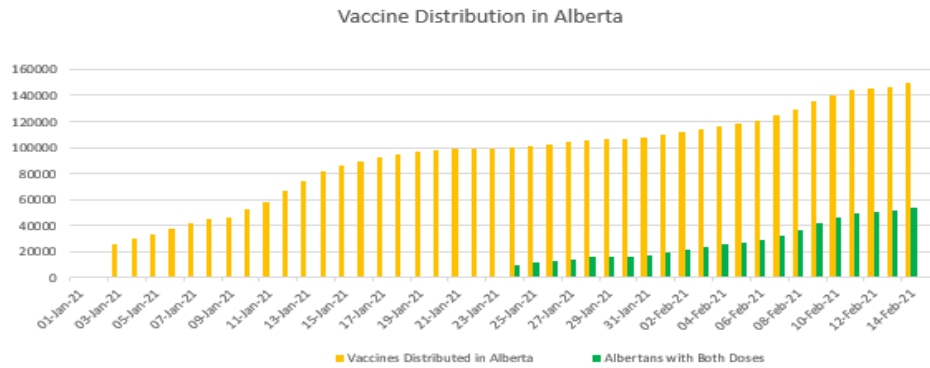

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Vaccine Updates



Variants in Alberta (Updated Feb. 11):

UK Variant (B.1.1.7) 214
SA Variant (B.1351) 7

All positive cases of Covid-19 are tested for the variants. All close contacts are double tested.

Isolation requirements for those infected with a variant, close contact, and household contacts are slightly different.

Vaccination Progress as of February 15:

149,138 doses of vaccine have been administered in Alberta, 2535 (2413 were 2nd doses) in the last 24 hours.

54,024 Albertans have received both doses and are fully immunized.

Rate of vaccination is 3372.7 doses per 100,000 population.

74 adverse events following immunization have been reported to Alberta Health and AHS. This rate is on par with this year's pneumococcal campaign. No safety signals have been reported. The benefit of being protected outweighs the very rare risk of having an adverse reaction – Dr. Hinshaw.

Early Phase 1 (Complete): December 2020: Immunizations will be offered to key populations, with a focus on acute care sites with the highest COVID-19 capacity concerns in Edmonton and Calgary:

- Health-care workers in intensive care units
- Respiratory therapists
- Staff in long term care and designated supportive living facilities

Phase 1A (In Progress): January 2021: Immunizations will be offered to key populations across the province:

- Paramedics and emergency medical technicians
- Alberta health-care workers in Covid-19 units, medical and surgical units, and operating rooms
- Respiratory therapists
- Health-care workers in intensive care units
- Staff in long term care and designated supportive living facilities
- Home care workers
- Health-care workers in emergency departments
- All residents of long-term care and designated supportive living, regardless of age

Phase 1B (February 2021): Timeline subject to change depending on vaccine supply

Immunizations will soon be offered to key populations:

- Seniors 75 years of age and over, no matter where they live
- First Nations, Métis and persons 65 years of age and over living in a First Nations community or Métis Settlement

Phase 2: April to Sept 2021 – continue targeting populations at risk

- Work to identify sequencing for Phase 2 groups is underway. Decisions will be made in the coming weeks.

Phase 3: Fall 2021

- Anticipated start of roll-out to the general public
