

#### **Review:**

As at March 31, 2020, the Municipality is showing an Annual Projections surplus / deficit of \$0. That is, we expect the revenues and expenses will achieve a balanced 2020 Annual Budget.

There is no expectation, at this time, that the Annual Budget will not be achieved.

The Budget YTD Variance Increase (Decrease) are the result of timing differences. Timing differences occur when actual results do not match the expected timing of the Annual Budget. However, at this time, we fully expect that the Actual results will match the Budget by the end of 2020.

<u>IMPORTANT NOTE:</u> This report does not show the ramifications of COVID-19 and the 2020 Flood. The effect of these events, as well as, the Council approved property tax rates, on May 27, 2020, will be reflected in reports commencing June 2020.

#### **Operating Revenues**


Year to date operating revenues to March 31, 2020 are \$184.0 million. On an annual basis the revenue projection is \$718.4 million.

#### **Operating Expenses**


Year to date operating expenses to March 31, 2020 are \$110.6 million. On an annual basis the expense projection is \$431.2 million.

#### **Operating Revenues**




#### **Municipal Revenues**






#### **Operating Expenses**

The Municipality approved the 2020 capital budget of \$154.1 million which includes \$0.7 million for Public Art. At March 31, 2020, the capital budget has been revised to \$155.2 million stemming from 2020 capital amendment increases of \$1.1 million. As of March 31, 2020, \$19.9 million has been spent on the delivery of capital projects.

The current amount of cash in the bank plus investments totals \$1.1 billion as of March 31, 2020. The commitments against this balance include \$200.9 million for operating requirements, \$44.7 million in deferred revenues, which is money the Municipality has received in advance but is committed to spend in the future and \$820.3 million in committed reserve funds.

#### **Investments**


The Municipality has \$822.5 million in investment holdings as of March 31, 2020, of which \$149.6 million are short-term investments with maturity dates under one year. Returns on investments to March 31, 2020 total \$6.4 million with \$4.7 million from investment income and \$1.7 million from interest income.

# Investment Holdings by Type - Book Values (in Millions)




#### **Debt**

Authority to incur debt for municipalities in Alberta is granted through Alberta Regulation (AR) 255/2000 of the Alberta Municipal Government Act (MGA) and in special cases, variation can be granted through a Ministerial Order. Sections 251 through 274 of the MGA provides guidance regarding indebtedness for operating and capital purposes.

The general debt limits for municipalities in Alberta allow for debt of 1.5 times revenue and 0.25 times revenue for debt service. Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo's debt limit is set at 2 times revenue and debt service limit is set at 0.35 times revenue through AR255/2000.

Council, through the Debt Management Policy (FIN-120), set the Municipality's limits at 85% of the Alberta Debt Limit Regulation (AR) 255/2000.



As of March 31, 2020, the Municipality has no committed drawn debt outstanding.

#### **Grants**

To date the Municipality has received approval for \$32.3 million in capital grants and \$1.9 million in operating grants.

There are five capital grant applications totaling \$89.1 million that have been submitted for consideration with the government. The capital grant applications include:

- Alberta Municipal Water/Wastewater Program (AMWWP) for \$49.9 million,
- Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program Green Infrastructure (Federal) for \$3.5 million for the Flood Mitigation project,
- Airports Capital Assistance Program (ACAP) for \$14.5 million for the Pavement Overlay project,
- GreenTRIP Grant Round 2 for \$3.4 million and
- Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program Public Transit for \$17.9 million.

Research into grant opportunities is an on-going process.



#### 2016 Wildfire

The Municipality has spent \$258.2 million in recoverable wildfire costs since May 2016 out of which \$15.4 million was incurred in the normal operations of the municipality. To date the Province has advanced \$209.3 million for reimbursable expenses under the Disaster Recovery Program, Red Cross has advanced \$9.0 million, FireSmart has advanced \$7.0 million and our insurance provider has paid \$29.6 million and closed the file as all claims are complete.

Administration is continuing to work with the Province to quantify claims. The Disaster Recovery Program (DRP) project summary estimate is \$250.3 million. As at March 31, 2020, \$216.3 million has been submitted to DRP or is a submission in progress.

The Red Cross has entered into an agreement with the Municipality to cover \$10.0 million of certain wildfire related costs and has advanced \$9.0 million, of which \$3.5 million has been spent on operating expenses, \$2.2 million has been received for permits not charged to residents and \$1.5 million has been spent on capital expenses towards this initiative.

The Municipality has an agreement with Government of Alberta Agriculture and Forestry to cover \$10.5 million of certain FireSmart wildfire related costs and has advanced \$7.0 million, of which \$4.0 million has been spent on operating expenses and \$1.1 million has been spent on capital expenses for this agreement.
